

Because of the deep challenges facing constitutional democracy in the United States—and the need to set high expectations for the knowledge, skills, and civic virtues of American citizens—the EAD Roadmap presents an ambitious agenda. Realizing it fully, so that every student in the country truly experiences excellent history and civic education from kindergarten through 12th grade, will require significant renewal and innovation in our educational system.

A Roadmap to Excellence in History and Civics

EAD shifts from breadth to depth by offering an inquiry framework that weaves history and civics together and inspires students to learn by asking difficult questions, then seeking answers in the classroom through facts and discussion.


The *EAD Roadmap* is neither a set of standards nor a curriculum. It recommends approaches to learning that:

Roadmap Policy Guidelines




- Schools should "integrate the teaching of history and civics" into a complementary curriculum K-12 that is focused on knowledge, skills and dispositions of civic readiness.
- Curriculum should *shift from breadth to depth*. Many state civics requirements read as long lists of facts and principles to be memorized. States should reconceive educational goals in terms of open-ended questions to stimulate analytical thinking.
- At the high-school level, civics should NOT take the form of a "one semester and done" class requirement.

Effective Approaches to Civics Education

The *EAD Roadmap* is neither a set of standards nor a curriculum, but recommendations for how to approach teaching and learning. Effective approaches:

- ★ Inspire students to want to become involved in their constitutional democracy and help to sustain our republic;
- ★ tell a full and complete narrative of America's plural, yet shared story;
- ★ celebrate the compromises needed to make our constitutional democracy work;
- ★ cultivate civic honesty and patriotism that leaves space to both love and critique this country; and
- ★ teach both history and civics through a timeline of events and themes that run through those events.





Emphasize Federalism


Federalism is a dynamic framework; It fits the changing nature of society and is redefined each generation








How does Kids Voting Support Civics Education in Fairbanks?

- Provide resources to teachers so students may be informed voters in mock elections (same ballots as the real elections)
- Offer professional development opportunities (with small stipend), including a 1-credit course "Civics across the Curriculum"
- Train liaisons in most schools to promote civics education and to support their colleagues' efforts
- Model lessons/units and support teachers in their efforts, as needed
- Fund civics field trips







